

### Introduction

The Betley Parish Council formally voted to start the development of a Neighbourhood Plan in May 2016 and set up a Steering Group to begin the process of developing the plan. To start the process a formal letter was sent to Newcastle under Lyme Borough Council requesting the parish of Betley, Balterley and Wrinehill be designated a Neighbourhood Plan area. Members of the steering group arranged an informal meeting with the planning officers at Newcastle Borough Council who were very supportive and agreed to prepare a plan clearly showing the parish boundary. Although aware that there would be a delay before Newcastle Borough Council could formally approve the request for the Neighbourhood area, based on the feedback from the council the steering group were confident to begin initial planning and informing the community of the intention to prepare a Neighbourhood Plan. Newcastle Borough Council formally approved the application on the 30<sup>th</sup> of August 2016. (view email from Newcastle borough council on website)

Betley is located on the Staffordshire/Cheshire border but although it has a Cheshire CW postcode it is in Staffordshire. In 2011 the combined population of Betley, Balterley and Wrinehill was recorded at 1254 with the majority located in the centre of Betley continuing on the main road through Wrinehill. The surrounding land in the Parish is mainly farmland (see below)



### **Community Engagement**

### **Betley Parish Magazine**


The first information to the community on the proposal to develop a Neighbourhood Plan, was through an article in the 2016 May addition of the Betley Parish magazine, stating the intention of the Parish Council to prepare a neighbourhood plan. A request was made to members of the parish for anyone who would like to help in the development of the Neighbourhood Plan to contact the Parish Council. (View page from the magazine on the website) The parish magazine has a monthly circulation of 435 copies and is delivered to a significant number of homes in the Parish.

### **Community Engagement Strategy**

The steering group in May recognised the need to involve all members of the Parish, community groups, business and stakeholders. A number of local parish councils have started the process of developing a Neighbourhood Plan including Keele and Weston. Members of the steering group made contact with their steering groups and information obtained was useful to all parties. The Weston Parish is in Cheshire but their parish boundary meets the Betley Parish at Balterley. Many of the problems of development in Weston would have an impact on the Betley parish. The various methods of advertising and involving the whole community in the development of the plan was discussed by the steering group and a "Community Engagement strategy" was prepared (see appendix 1).

### **Betley Neighbourhood Plan Website**

The community engagement strategy identified the need to develop a website at an early stage. The website <a href="www.bbwplan.org">www.bbwplan.org</a> was completed in June 2016. This provides information to the community including the Parish boundary map, up to date documents including minutes of the steering group meetings, latest news and a facility to contact the steering group. The website is updated at regular intervals. A link to the Neighbourhood Plan website was made on the Betley Parish Council official website.



The website address <a href="www.bbwplan.org">www.bbwplan.org</a> was listed in the leaflet delivered to all residents in the parish. To encourage members of the community to keep up to date with progress on the Neighbourhood Plan, posters were located at various locations around the Parish including the village shop, The reading room, The Hand and Trumpet, The Swan, the village hall and parish notice boards. ### **Information Letter and Leaflets**

**On the** 12<sup>th</sup> July 2016 an information letter and leaflets were delivered by members of the steering group to all residences in the parish. Delivered in the prepared envelope shown below. The letter informed all the residents in the parish of the intention to develop the Neighbourhood plan and the future importance of a completed plan. While delivering the letter the steering group members talked to as many people as possible receiving a positive response. ### **Road Shows**

At a steering group meeting a series of roadshows was planned to take place in July and August 2016. The dates for the road shows was listed on the leaflet distributed with the letter to all residents. The first event was held on Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> of July 2016 in Betley Village hall and consisted of an information display with large maps of the parish boundary and an introductory talk and computer display. This first event was attended by eleven members of the public together with a good number of steering group members. Positive and supportive feedback was received. A form and suggestion box was made available to start the process of receiving resident views.

The second event was held on the morning of Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> of July 2016 in the Reading room in Betley. Twenty five members of the parish were in attendance and again there was a good information display and slide show.



On the 6<sup>th</sup> Of August 2016 a road show display was set up at Betley show. The information was seen by many people and encouraged more residents to offer their support to help in the development of the Neighbourhood Plan.

The final event in the series was on the evening of the 18<sup>th</sup> of August 2016 in the village hall. Although attended by a small number of residents another offer of help was received.

To further inform the members of the parish about the importance of the Neighbourhood plan a "pop up" information stand was located at a number of places in the parish. The image below was the stand located on East Lawns on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> September 2016.



### **Neighbourhood Plan Questionnaire**

The Betley Balterley and Wrinehill Parish Neighbourhood Plan Questionnaire was developed as part of the community engagement strategy to obtain the views of residents in the Parish on a number of issues.

The questionnaire was developed by members of the Neighbourhood plan steering group acting on behalf of the Parish Council in December 2016 and January 2017, with final changes made in February 2017. Residents in the parish were informed through the Parish magazine, the Neighbourhood Plan website and posters located at various locations in the village advertising the website, that the questionnaire was being developed and would be circulated in March 2017.


At their Parish council meeting on the 26<sup>th</sup> of January 2017 councillors formally approved the content and layout of the questionnaire with a number of design changes. The steering group applied for a grant to cover the costs of printing and postage. This was approved in February 2017.

576 questionnaires were delivered by volunteers to all residences in the Parish commencing 11<sup>th</sup> March 2017. Deliveries were recorded to ensure no properties were missed . The return date for completed questionnaires was 31<sup>st</sup> March 2017. The questionnaire was delivered in an A4 printed envelope containing a covering letter, The questionnaire and a postage paid envelope. An actual printed questionnaire together with the delivery record evidence is available for viewing.

In addition to paper questionnaires, an online version of the questionnaire was developed matching the questions on the paper version using Smartsurvey.co.uk. Details on how to access the online version were provided in an information letter delivered with the paper questionnaires.

A final total of 311 completed questionnaires were returned consisting of 57 online questionnaires and 254 paper questionnaires. A pre-paid envelope was provided to encourage the return of the paper questionnaires.

The return of 311 questionnaires represents an over 50% response rate which provides significant numbers and evidence of community engagement.




Online questionnaire

A comparison of the Betley Parish community population age range, taken from the 2011 Census Data compared to the results from the Parish Neighbourhood Plan Questionnaire results.

To support the validity of the Betley, Balterley and Wrinehill Parish Neighbourhood Plan Questionnaire, the age range of the Betley Parish community population taken from the 2011 Census data was compared to the results from question 17 on the Parish Questionnaire.

As can be seen from the chart below the percentage results are very close in all age ranges and this indicates the questionnaires returned are a representative sample of the total Betley Parish population.

Proviso: As stated in the Neighbourhood Plan questionnaire summary report, the numbers from question 17 on the questionnaire should not be taken as an exact figure. If more than one questionnaire was completed in a household this could affect the total. However no household requested an additional paper questionnaire. The percentage total from the 2011 census was extracted from a published chart and may not be exact.

### **Contact with Business and Community Groups**

Although some Businesses and organisations may have already completed a Neighbourhood Plan questionnaire, the Neighbourhood Plan Steering group decided to approach businesses and organisations in the Parish to request their views and ask "What would help them to develop their business or organisation".

This process was started in November 2017 and continued into 2018. An introductory letter was prepared (view the letter on the website) ) and a summary table listing business and organisation developed).

The initial approach was for Steering group volunteers to approach the business or organisation directly and record the feedback. A document of replies is available.

Comments from this exercise include:

### **Consultation with Newcastle-Under-Lyme Borough Council**

At the start of the Neighbourhood plan process in 2016, members of the Betley, Balterley and Wrinehill Neighbourhood Plan Steering group met with representatives of the Newcastle-under-LymeBorough council to state the intention to start development of the Neighbourhood Plan.

Initially the council representatives were very supportive and they supplied the detailed map clearly showing the Betley Parish boundary. (full map available on BBWplan.org website). As required, the Betley Parish Council in a letter, formally requested permission to develop a Neighbourhood Plan. (See website BBWplan.org ) In an email the council approved the application in August 2016. (see website)

Fully aware that the Neighbourhood Plan must take into account the development of the combined Newcastle-under-Lyme and Stoke-on-Trent Local Plan the steering group have met a number of times informally with representatives of the Borough Council Planning Department to discuss related issues.

The steering group has responded formally to consultation documents issued by the Borough Council including the joint local plan and preferred options consultation. The steering group made a strong and detailed argument against the housing needs statistics detailed in the preferred options document. (see website bbwplan.org)

In the summer of 2018 the two members of Newcastle Borough council staff responsible for helping with Neighbourhood Plan development left the authority . Subsequent formal letters from the Steering group to the Borough council requesting information on who would be responsible for the development for the development of the local plan and liaison with Neighbourhood Plan Steering groups failed to obtain a reply from the Borough Council.



Dear Neighbour,

Thank you for taking the time to read this.

The Parish Council has decided to produce a **Neighbourhood Plan** for the parish of Betley, Balterley and Wrinehill. You may be aware that in 2005 a Parish Plan was produced in which the community set out the things it would like to see in the future. We have now undertaken a detailed review of that Parish Plan and the enclosed booklet highlights many of the things that have been achieved in the last decade.

Times have now moved on and the planning landscape has changed. Under the *Localism Act (2011)* the Government made provision for communities to produce Neighbourhood Plans. These plans, unlike Parish Plans, have a real input into and impact on planning decisions made by local authorities. The Parish Council feel that it is important to find the views of residents in the parish before producing a Neighbourhood Plan that will feed those views into the Newcastle and Stoke Joint Local Plan. The Neighbourhood Plan will give us all the chance to say what kind of developments we want to see (and, perhaps more importantly, don't want to see) in the parish over the next 15 or so years.

Later this year we will be circulating a questionnaire to all residents to find out in more detail how they would like the parish to develop in the coming years. This questionnaire will be used as the basis for writing the Neighbourhood Plan which, when completed, will then be submitted to residents for approval in a referendum. If approved the Neighbourhood Plan will then go to the Borough Council and become a legal part of the planning process.

The Parish Council has decided to prepare a Neighbourhood Plan for the whole of the Parish. Once it has been produced, a local Referendum will give you the opportunity to vote on the approval of the Plan.

# What is a Neighbourhood Development Plan?

A Neighbourhood Development Plan ('Plan') is a set of policies decided by the community. These policies state where and how land can be used, for example to develop housing, business premises and community facilities in a local area. It also considers how the environment will be protected. The Plan has a legal impact on planning applications, as the local authority must refer to the Neighbourhood Development Plan when making planning decisions.

### Why we need one?

We need a Plan so that local people can say how they want their community to develop and change in the future. These views can then feed into the planning system via the Plan.

Other local parishes are producing plans to protect themselves from unwanted development – without one we may become a target for developers.

### Who is making the Plan?

A group of residents from all three villages in the parish have volunteered to work on the Plan. But the Plan needs the ideas and participation of the whole community.



# What progress has been made since the 2005 Parish Plan?

Vision: Speed Limits to be reinforced.

- Community Speed Watch Scheme in operation since 2014
- Regular deployment of Mobile Speed Camera Van by Safer Roads Partnership.
- Parish Council and the Safer Roads Partnership have deployed mobile digital speed signs. Parish Council has now secured funding to buy its own mobile digital sign.
- County Council undertaking a review of traffic on Church Lane after lobbying by Parish

# Vision: To improve the safety of pedestrians.

- Parish Council ensures regular clearing of paths and allocates money towards it. County Council to re-pave areas of the parish in summer 2016 after lobbying by Parish

### Healthcare

Vision: Maintain a single doctor practice in the parish.

- The parish still has a thriving surgery.
- Dispensing arrangements still in place and prescriptions can now be ordered online via Vision: Maintain current dispensing arrangements

Patient Access

- Vision: Development of additional facilities and services for residents.
  - A late surgery is held every Monday until 7pm
- Surgery opens on Saturdays for annual flu jabs

Vision: Provision of a programme of crime prevention advice and measures

- Police 'incident van' visits Betley Show and other sites in the parish to deliver crime
  - Regular Police Surgeries held at the Reading Room funded by the Parish Council prevention information
